

#### **Market Review**

MSCI India IMI index was up 0.7% during October. US equities (S&P 500) were down 2.9%, MSCI World down 3.3%, and MSCI EM up 1.8% in GBP terms.

FPIs bought US\$2.5bn worth of Indian equities during the month. The yearto-date inflows stand at US\$6.5bn. Crude oil prices decreased by 11.7% and INR depreciated by 1.7%.

Among sectors, financials and information technology outperformed while energy and health care underperformed during the month.

#### Performance Review

The fund was up 0.4% in October, underperforming the benchmark by 24bps. The key contributors include Asian Paints (+11.0%), ICICI Bank (+10.2%), and HDFC Bank (+9.2%), whereas some of the main underperformers were Garware Technical Fibres (-12.1%), Bajaj Finserv (-5.2%), and Persistent Systems (-14.0%).

Year-to-date the fund is up 9.3%, outperforming the benchmark by +1006bps. The key contributors include Infosys (+34.8%), Navin Fluorine (+120.6), and Muthoot Finance (+64.2%), whereas some of the main detractors were Bajaj Finserv (-41.4%), Bajaj Finance (-22.7%), and HDFC Asset Management (-29.8%).
